ngnway departments in South-west Michigan.

First, they let a bunch of bug watchers stop the completion of the most needed interchange of 1-94 and U.S. 31 10 years ago, at a cost of probably 20 percent of what it will cost today. Then they made a beautiful concrete interchange on Napier Avenue and paved about a mile or two of beautiful four-lane highway, a five-lane bridge, paved shoulders grass medium, road signs and all – leading to a dead end, probably at a cost of \$30 million or so.
