### LMC women rout Rochester

The Lake Michigan College women's basketball team won handily over Rochester College in the Oakland Tournament on Saturday.

The Red Hawks Sabrina Trujillo and Lexi Hobbs each scored 21 points in the 91-47 win.

LMC (7-1) dominated from the start, taking a 43-18 lead into the half, and only continued its strong shooting in the second.

Sarah Huffman and Kaitelyn Smith also scored in double figures for LMC.

Smith also collected 12 rebounds in the winning effort.

### LMC men beat Rochester JV

Ken Coats scored 25 points and the Lake Michigan College men's basketball team won in convincing fashion, 94-54, over Rochester JV.

Coats hit six of the Red Hawks 16 3-pointers in the game and led the team in rebounds with seven.

Alec Brown, Austin Shesky and Cameron Reeves also scored in double figures as well for LMC (7-4).

The Red Hawks led 41-16 at halftime.

LMC will host fourth-ranked South Suburban on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m.

### Saban, Alabama reach long-term agreement

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — Alabama coach Nick Saban is staying put.

The school announced on its Twitter account Friday night that the football coach has reached "a long-term agreement" to remain with the Crimson Tide.

Alabama didn't release terms of the new deal, which must be approved by the board of trustees.

The agreement quells speculation that Saban would take over at Texas if Mack Brown steps down. Saban, who turned 62 on Oct. 31, has led the Tide to three national championships in the past four years.

Saban received an eight-year deal in March 2012 worth about \$5.6 million annually.

### Texas coach Mack Brown resigns

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas says coach Mack Brown has stepped down and that the Alamo Bowl against Oregon on Dec. 30 will be his last game with the Longhorns.

The school announced the move Saturday.

Brown led the Longhorns to the 2005 national championship and ranks second at the school in career victories. He's stepping down after 16 seasons — and one tumultuous week of reports and speculation that this was coming.

He is 158-47 at Texas, but 30-20 the last four seasons, including 19-17 in the Big 12.

The 62-year-old Brown was hired at Texas from North Carolina in 1997 and was credited with reviving a dormant program. Texas had a run of dominance from 2001-2009 when the Longhorns went 101-16. He is one of the highest-paid coaches in the country at \$5.4 million this year.

### IOC to set up \$10m anti-doping fund

LONDON (AP) — IOC President Thomas Bach says the Olympic body is putting up \$10 million to develop new anti-doping tests and methods.

Bach says the International Olympic Committee is also asking governments to contribute the same amount to the anti-doping fight.
