As a musician, Quinn's biggest challenge is capturing Barrett's lurching, freeform approach as well as the bluesy psychedelic maj-esty of David Gilmour, who replaced Barrett during "Saucerful Of Secrets."

"It's important that you get the attitude, the signature licks, the tonalities," Quinn says, "and that you really present these songs the way they were designed. There's a lot of attention to detail. It's a lot easier to get Svd than it is to get David."

Quinn's love of Pink Floyd goes back to 1973, the year of "Dark Side" and started his first band. While Quinn also cites Joe Walsh and Leslie West "The Division Bell." among his influences, the

"At that point, we had mastered the music, but we had zero production values," Quinn says. "They said, 'Well, we'll take this band and put them in our huge, mind-bending concept of a Pink Floyd show.' They certainly had the wherewithal to do it, so here comes the quadriphonic sound up in the rafters. They took it to the next level."

The current tour covers 27 cities in five weeks starting in Red Bank, N.J., and winding up in Vancouver, Canada, by the first week in April. Wherever you see the show, however, Quinn vows that the experience will leave a lasting impression.

"My job is to make sure that the integrity of the music is there," he says. "It's self. We don't have any prerecorded tracks. It's per-

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
