site visits to the college, and
more intense one-on-one
sessions, LMC board President Mary Jo Tomasini told her colleagues during Tues-day's meeting.

"Once we do that, we hope to narrow it down to

hope to narrow it down to the people that we want to hold further interviews with," Tomasini said after the meeting. "The hope is that we will be able to do those interviews in the mid-dle of November, if we can get them all lined up, and airplane tickets, and that sort of thing."

If that schedule holds, and everything runs

If that schedule holds, and everything runs smoothly, the board would likely call a special meeting by the end of November to decide on the finalist, Tomasini said.

"Hopefully, we'll be able to introduce someone at the board meeting in December. If that plan goes awry, then we'll come up with a Plan B," she said.

LMC President Bob Harrison is retiring in Decem-

rison is retiring in December, after 16 years with the college, which he's led since 2009.

Gabbard was the only in-ternal candidate to apply

for the job.

The 19-member search committee, which Tomas ini chairs, started with 7 applicants, who had unti Sept. 14 to declare their interest.

The college's search consultant, Future Man agement Systems of Bev erly, Mass., then whittled down the field to the 15 candidates strongest from which the final size emerged, Tomasini said.

Future Managemen will continue to vet the current field with back ground and reference checks, as well as character and personality as sessments, LMC's new release said.

The committee wil have a full day planner for the candidates, once they arrive, Tomasin said.
