Lakeshore welding program gets state notoriety

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STEVENSVILLE — Lakeshore High School's welding program is receiving statewide attention.

A crew filmed students welding at the high school Wedneday in preparation for Governor's Economic Summit, which will be March 15 at the DeVos Place Convention Center in Grand Rap-

"This is just a huge honor for us because out of all the programs in the entire state, and there's over 60 welding programs, we were chosen to be a part of this economic summit," said Adam Carr, the school's welding instructor.

The footage will be in a piece highlighting career and technical education (CTE) programs in the state. The crew shot footage of other Berrien County CTE programs, including the Professional Health Careers Academy at Lakeland Hospital in Niles, a manufacturing program in Brandywine High School and a firefighters program in Berrien Springs. Berrien RESA coordinates the county's CTE. Students from member high schools can attend each other's CTE programs.
