YouTube sensation Jeffrey Perez steps into Michael Jackson's very big shoes

BENTON HARBOR — On Feb. 27, beat boxer Shaun "Anointed S" Roig, uploaded a video on YouTube of he and Michael Jackson tribute artist Jeffrey Perez performing "Leave Me Alone," a song off Jackson's "1987 "Bad" album.

A few week's later, Perez got a phone call.

"Shaun calls me up and says, 'I think we're going viral! I think we're going viral!'" Perez says during a phone interview from Las Vegas. "We've always done videos together and we vibe off of each other a lot. We were like glue and we were promoting a show we were doing and we just decided to do this little short clip, but for some reason it caught fire."

The video did indeed go viral with more than 40 million views worldwide. One of those viewers happened to be Ellen DeGeneres, who invited Roig and Perez to perform another Jackson song, "P.Y.T.," on her daytime talk show in April.

"I just remember Michael Jackson always being a part of my life since I was a little kid," Perez says. "I could barely walk and I was dancing to Michael Jackson. I listened to his music and watched his videos for many, many years. I was hooked at a very young age. We moved a lot because we were a military family, but I did school plays and choir, just anything I could do to get on stage."

He grew up mastering Jackson's sound, body language and look. Winning his high school talent contest as Jackson cemented Perez's career trajectory.

Friday's show will feature both Perez and Brandon "Michael" Jones as Jackson at various career stages with additional vocals by Charlie Charles and Candace Chavez backed by musicians Ron Simpson (bass), Barry Reed Jr. (keyboards), Joey Trujillo (guitar), Ashton Burris (drums), and dancers Terrill "Mekka" Ladd, Javaun Scott, Stephen Rollins and Aaron Smith.

The material includes hits such as "Bad," "Beat It," "Billie Jean," "Man in The Mirror," "Rock With You," "The Way You Make Me Feel," "Thriller," and more.

"I cover much of the younger era of his life," Perez says. "Getting inside the character takes some time because of the makeup and the full costume, but also because you have to get your mind right. They are really big shoes to fill. No when can ever be Michael Jackson so it is always a learning and growing process. We just try to give the best tribute possible, and we all do it from our heart. Michael Jackson had something special that no one else had. There seemed to be magic in his music. That's what we are trying to capture.'

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
