## **Timeless folk tale told through R**

**Russian National Ballet** Theatre presents classic 'Cinderella' on Friday at LMC Mendel Center

BENTON HARBOR - The classic folk tale of a young woman living in unfortunate circumstances, suddenly changed to remarkable fortune has been presented in thousands of variants throughout the world in pages, on stage and on screen.

The oldest documented version comes from China around 830; the oldest European version from Italy in 1634. The most popular telling of the story was first published by Charles Perrault in "Histoires ou contes du temps passé" in 1697, and in the 19th century by the German brothers Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm in their folk tale collection "Grimms' Fairy Tales."

Although the name of the title character has often changed depending on the language for which it is told, in English folklore the heroine is simply known as Cinderella.

For Alexander Daev, ballet master and assistant artistic director of Russian National Ballet Theatre, however, there is something that feels distinctly Russian about the tale.
