The memo further noted that, over the last decade, high-definition video systems have become the standard in classrooms and arts opportunities locally conference centers "due to accessible in southwestern the vast improvement in Michigan," said Mendel quality that comes with the higher resolution."

Hahn said she expects the new equipment to be in place by mid-September, "just in time for our first Economic Club speaker," she said.

LMC this year took over the series, which features an array of big names from finance, politics and show business.

LMC had been working on the video project since May, when it sent out a request for proposals.

Three companies responded, including Bluewater Technologies, TEL Systems and TPC, who all participated in the mandatory site visit and walkthrough, the memo said.

However, TPC was the only company to respond, which isn't unusual in these situations, LMC President Trevor Kubatzke said.

Asked why only one firm pursued the project, Kubatzke replied, "We're seeing a number of construction projects – for instance, you've got a number of hotels going up along the highway (by I-94). People are busy right now, so it's difficult to get a contractor."

In another Mendelrelated item, the board decided to seek a \$20.000

grant from the Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs to help cover the cost of putting on the musical "Cabaret," which is scheduled for May 3, 2018. The show is part of the Mendel's 26th annual performing arts series.

The series is intended to "make quality performing Center Executive Director Mike Nadolski, in a memo to the board.

The college expects to cover its cash match from the show's revenue, so no additional fundraising will be needed, Nadolski said.



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
